05.05.2020	Hyperinflammatory shock in children during COVID-19 pandemic	The Lancet Correspondence	 Paediatricians describe a cluster of 8 children with hyperinflammatory shock with multiorgan failure, showing features similar to Kawasaki disease shock syndrome or toxic shock syndrome, during a period of 10 days in mid-April 2020 in a UK hospital. All children were previously fit and well Authors believe this is a new phenomenon affecting previously asymptomatic children w/SARS-CoV-2 infection The intention of this Correspondence is to bring this subset of children to the attention of the wider paediatric community and to optimise early recognition and management

All had fever, gastrointestinal symptoms were common and respiratory symptoms in less than half. 4 SARS-CoV-2-positive, 10 negative (6 later antibody positive), 1 indeterminate

06.05.2020	The potential impact of the COVID-19 response on tuberculosis in high-burden countries: a modelling analysis	Stop TB Partnership with ICL, Avenir Health, Johns Hopkins University and USAID Report	 This modelling analysis estimates that under a 3 month lockdown and a protracted 10 month restoration of services, there could be an additional 6.3 million TB cases and an additional 1.4 million TB deaths globally between 2020 and 2025 Global TB incidence and deaths in 2021 would increases to levels last seen in between 2013 and 2016 respectively – a setback of 5-8 years The modelling focussed on 3 high burden countries – India, Kenya and Ukraine – and extrapolated estimates The model can be replicated in any other country and findings used for data-driven decisions and financial requests To minimise the impact of C19 on TB measures must be taken by national governments to ensure continuity of TB diagnostic, treatment and prevention services during lockdown and a catch-up effort to test, track and trace TB.

Rapid review methodology

The rapid daily search for peer-reviewed literature is carried out through a PubMed search with the following keywords ("COVID-19" OR "severe acute respiratory syndrome coronavirus 2" OR "2019-nCoV" OR "SARS-CoV-2" OR "2019nCoV" OR "coronavirus") AND ("Africa") OR ("equity" OR "equities") OR ("poverty"), restricted to articles published in the previous 2 to 3 days, in English. This is complemented by a search of the homepage of the following high-impact global health journals: The Lancet journals, New England Journal of Medicine, Nature, JAMA, Annals of Internal Medicine, Cochrane Reviews, BMJ Global Health, the PLoS journals and a Twitter search of their Twitter pages. A search also of preprints from bioRxiv and medRxiv. Please note that papers that have not been peer-reviewed are highlighted in red. All primary research papers that relate to the primary and secondary impacts of the COVID-19 response in LMICs, and disease control and health system responses are included. Articles related to tackling the secondary impacts on other sectors are not included. Additional commentaries, opinions, and commissioned pieces are selected based on relevance.

The search for dashboards, guidelines, tools, editorials, comments, blogs, opinions and news is through the academic journals listed above, C19 resource hubs and following lead academics and professionals on Twitter.
