7 October 2020	The UK's Overseas Operations Bill: Good Questions, Wrong Answers	Michael Clarke; RUSI; opinion piece	Argues that although fraudulent claims against UK troops are a problem, the Bill has flaws that may 'put the UK at odds with the Geneva Conventions and the International Criminal Court (ICC)'. It highlights the Bill's provision for a 'presumption against prosecution' after five years, which is 'in effect' a statute of limitations. This would contradict IHL, which states there can be no statute of limitations against war crimes and crimes against humanity. This could lead the ICC to claim jurisdiction over

November 2020	Survey on the Coverage, Operational Reach, and Effectiveness of Humanitarian Aid	Humanitarian Outcomes' CORE research; report	Provides research on access challenges in northeast Nigeria, Afghanistan and the Central African Republic. It finds access constraints leading to aid agencies clustering in relatively safer areas and consequently lower coverage per head in more dangerous areas. Using data from aid agencies, affected populations and context-specific data, it provides analysis of access constraints and gaps, and offers suggestions for improvements. It finds some humanitarian organisations are developing access strategies, but more are needed. Solutions include more negotiation capacity for access in conflict; and a broader conception of 'access' focusing on how to support communities in protracted conflicts.	\bigstar

It finds several factors inhibiting UN protection advocacy: a lack of clarity on the roles of UN entities and leaders; a lack of political support for those who undertake 'protection advocacy'; a fragmented UN system; a

Broader barriers to POC include the geopolitical climate and state policies; waning UN influence; capacity gaps and risk aversion.	*
