It finds that relatively few refugees are covered by government responses compared to humanitarian responses. Humanitarian actors tended to align values disbursed with government programmes, although this did not always meet the needs of refugees. Collaboration between government and humanitarian actors, and mature social protection systems both enabled better responses.

Evidence from Syrian Displacement in Mashreq	Lori Beaman, Harun Onder and Stefanie Onder; World Bank working paper	Finds that by mid-2018, 1.8% of the 5.6 million Syrian refugees had returned to the country. Using administrative data, conflict data, nightlights data and household surveys, it finds that reductions in conflict, increased luminosity, as well as improved conditions in host countries, increase returns.	***
