Finds that legal action can be an effective tool, but must be carefully considered as part of broader advocacy campaigns, and risks must be taken into consideration.

Barriers include bureaucracy; favouritism and partiality; humanitarian focus on IDPs; restrictive UN risk management; and a focus on familiar areas. Data on amounts and types of aid, and obstacles to access.

The blog argues that, given the small number of sanctioned individuals, who are usually in leadership positions in sanctioned groups, it is highly unlikely that any one on a sanctions list would also be on a humanitarian recipient list. However, the existing recipient-selection process is itself a risk mitigation process (identifying vulnerability criteria and dialogue with citizens and authorities). Screening is still likely to be used as a way to signal commitment to anti-terrorism laws.

June 2021	Overcoming barriers to coordinating across social protection and humanitarian assistance – building on promising practices	Gabrielle Smith; SPACE; tools and guidance	Discusses promising practices for co-ordinating actors - humanitarian, development, and government - in social protection and humanitarian assistance. Experiences from Covid-19 include joint assessments, forums, funding mechanisms, data sharing, and others. Provides lessons and recommendations on good co-ordination.	
July 2021	Social protection response to Covid-19 and beyond Emerging evidence and learning for future crises	Francesca Bastagli and Christina Lowe; ODI HPG; working paper	Analyses social protection as a crisis response tool, following a massive expansion since Covid-19. Based on data on current funding and interests and institutions driving current arrangements, as well as analysis of potential benefits of new models.	

July 2021	From knowing to doing: evidence use in the humanitarian sector	Anna Paterson, Fred Carden and Teresa Hanley; ELRHA; learning paper	Explores the challenges of using research to inform humanitarian practice. Finds four key barriers: time pressures, funding constraints, lack of relevance to humanitarian policy and practice, and lack of relevance to humanitarian actors in the Global South. It provides case studies of successful evidence use and recommendations for better uptake.	
May 2021	Funding disasters: tracking global humanitarian and development funding for response to natural hazards	Elle Crossley et al; Centre for Disaster Protection/Development Initiatives; working paper	Analyses international funding for disasters in Kenya, Lesotho, Peru, Mozambique, Haiti, Vanuatu, Nepal, Indonesia, and DRC. Its findings include that preparedness could be improved; funding is often late; 2.8% is fast humanitarian funding; there is more money for rapid-onset crises, but less for droughts; development actors provide significant amounts of funding (74%) but it is often slow; 53% of funding is loans.
