Summary Recent and Prospective Work

1. My research (and consultancy) work has been in four main clusters:
 - a. economic co-operation among developing countries (with special reference to Southern Africa);
 - b. low income countries and international financial system (with special reference to Africa);
 - c. ways and means to achieve structural adjustment and basic needs oriented growth particularly in Sub-Saharan Africa (with special reference to Tanzania);
 - d. pre independence political economic analysis and outlining of policy possibilities for Namibia.
2. In each case my work has been public policy oriented, i.e. in the overlap area of macro and sectoral economic analysis, institutional examination and policy option identification. While there has been a regional (Southern African) focus and, within that, concentration on two countries (Namibia and Tanzania) much of the work is relevant at least in part to low income and structurally disadvantaged economies more generally.
3. I have carried out a substantial volume of consultancy and borderline consultancy/funded applied research in each of the research areas. The areas include macro-economic, external balance and fiscal as well as financial aspects of natural gas utilisation in Tanzania; general advisory, technical support and background analysis for SADCC (Southern African Development Coordination Conference), UNIN (United Nations Institute for Namibia) and SWAPO, and special studies on aspects of the international financial system for G24, UNCTAD, Commonwealth, our "imported inflation" project as well as impact of recession and children in Africa for UNICEF. Finance has come from SIDA, CFTC, UNDP, UNIN, Kuwait/OPEC Funds.
4. I have participated in a number of conferences and have had continued links with World Council of Churches (general political economics/poverty area with special reference to food and hunger); Catholic Institute for International Relations (especially in respect to Southern Africa and EEC-ACP conventions); British Council of Churches/Christian Aid (general international context with reference to development); International Council for Adult Education (broader economic aspects of literacy/adult education); and International Center for Law in Development (institutional and legal aspects of basic needs oriented development). I serve on advisory committees to the first three and as a trustee of the last.
5. My teaching in the recent past has been concentrated on PhD advising (3 have now completed and 2 are making final minor revisions) plus modest numbers of lectures in other fellows' courses, seminars, conferences.
6. At the moment I envisage a somewhat similar pattern of research, consultancy, institutional contacts, teaching but with renewed Study Seminar participations beginning with international economic negotiation SS in 1984.

7. In economic cooperation my concerns turn on analysis of how non-conventional (based on common interest package focused on production, not neo-classical common market focused on trade) pattern can be pushed beyond initial "easy area" package; how production orientation can be extended to cover (validating) trade; and how difficulties in respect to sources and levels of funding can be overcome. The basic case in my work will be SADCC. (Of course what I prove may be the negative, i.e. "not possible" as answer to each question.)
8. In low income countries and international financial system, I am completing Tanzania for "imported inflation", assisting Stephany in African debt study and will probably be involved in second Dell-Lawrence adjustment study (with special reference in my case to Zimbabwe). Part of the questions turn on actual levels, trajectories, implications for future of external debt. The balance relate to what type of international financial system support related to what type (and duration) of adjustment programme for these countries would be both beneficial and potentially practicable.
9. Structural adjustment/basic needs oriented development work will continue to centre on SSA and probably on Tanzania. Further work in Uganda (followup of 1980 consultancy/study at height of Magendo) and Kenya (followup involvement in SID Kenya conference on restoring development in Africa) is possible. The key questions are causes and broad magnitudes of declines, possible routes to initial stabilisation, alternative approaches to renewed growth (assuming "Africa Into Economic Oblivion" does not become title capsuling findings.)
10. Namibia work is likely to turn on UNIN centred "Comprehensive Study" (like UNCTAD's Chidzero Report on Zimbabwe), with probable additional work relative to topics of special concern to ILO, UNCTC, SWAPO. The basic questions are present state and trajectory of economy, probable exogenous (beyond Namibian policy control) changes at independence, possible strategy-policy-management choices at macro and sectoral levels.

Long Term Assignments/Funded Research

1. I have not had a long term assignment away from IDS. Whether I propose to do so over 1984-89 is unclear for reasons beyond my or prospective employers' control.
2. If Namibia becomes independent and/or SWAPO sets up a full time pre-independence professional economic advisory unit I am likely to be asked to be an economic adviser to Namibia and/or SWAPO. This would be technical assistance (probably Nordic) funded. In that case I would wish to take a two year "leave"/"secondment" or whatever form proved most suitable.
3. It is possible that the Southern African Development Coordination Conference (SADCC) might wish at some point to rearrange my consultancy work for them (to date handled as standard short term IDS consultancies as, when, where needed) to include a 6 to 18 month stretch in Gaborone.
4. However, the first case depends on geo-political evolutions (convolutions) I am not so foolish (nor omniscient) as to predict and the second on patterns of institutional evolution as yet unclear. Because I wish to be able to respond if either of these requests does materialize, I am not keen to tie myself down to any other long commitment away from IDS.
5. I was involved in raising the SIDA finance to support general applied research/consultancy in respect to Southern Africa. In practice this has been funded research and has made a substantial contribution to non-core earnings. The 1983 followup grant (via SADCC Liaison Committee) and the 1981-84 funding in respect to consultancy on hydrocarbon development in Tanzania (the former SIDA and the latter CFTC/SIDA) are more narrowly defined consultancy work relating to one person. In one form or another both are likely to continue through 1985.
6. I was involved in the negotiations with the World Bank both as to a set of basic needs research studies and as to a team (long term and specialist consultancy) input into planning in Uganda. However, both in the end proved abortive.
7. In addition I have worked in several borderline funded research/consultancy projects including the Seers/Griffith-Jones imported inflation (Kuwait Fund/OPEC Fund) and the UNICEF State of the World's Children 1983 (impact of depression in Africa) ones and was involved in negotiating part of the content of the latter. Similarly I am the supporting person (second consultant) in the Griffith-Jones African debt study for UNCTAD (which relates to her meeting her outside funding target).
8. To sum up:
 - a. there are two long term assignments (Namibia and SADCC) which may materialize over 1984-89 which I would wish to be able to take up;
 - b. therefore I would not wish to find some other year's assignment precisely because it could well foreclose the Namibia or SADCC options;
 - c. I have been involved in one major piece of outside fundraising and worked to help us carry out two other smaller ones;

- d. in addition I have secured a number of consultancies related to my overall IDS work some of which are continuing and believe I can secure more;
 - e. while I realize that the effect of "d" is not precisely the same as being on assignment and off payroll, the other revenue impact to IDS is substantial (as indicated in my work point total which is largely consultancy or mixed consultancy/sponsored applied research);
 - f. thus I would much prefer flexibility as to whether and when I would be on a long term (off payroll) assignment so that I am free to take up a "secondment" to Namibia when its independence becomes imminent. I would, in fact, expect that to be before 1989 but, for evident reasons, am in no position to guarantee a specific set of dates.
9. To be candid, it is also my view that there should be flexibility in respect to the balance of teaching, consultancy, sponsored research and long term away assignments with no assumption that each fellow will necessarily do some of each in each quinquennium. I do not believe this to be special pleading as I argued it in 1979-80 when we were drawing up the restructuring for this quinquennium. At that point Namibian independence seemed likely within the 1981/1986 quinquennium so that I thought it possible I would be seeking a two year leave of absence prior to the expiry of my current contract. My view was, and is, that the need for adequate money raising/saving at macro (institute) level should be met in the way most consistent with high quality and quantity of IDS output and - subject to meeting the macro target - with maximum flexibility in how each fellow makes his/her contribution thereto. I accept that this also requires flexibility on the part of fellows, e.g. in accepting consultancies and working to fill out team consultancies/projects secured by other fellows even if these are not their own first priorities and have sought to be flexible in that respect.
10. In that context, I do, if in 1986 neither the Namibia nor the SADCC assignment seems likely to take place, commit myself to participating in a funded research project (including helping developing and securing finance for it) or securing an outside assignment for at least 12 months.
