



Covid-19, Conflict, and Governance Evidence Summary No.7

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This weekly Covid-19, Conflict, and Governance Evidence Summary aims to signpost DFID and other UK government departments to the latest evidence and opinions on Covid-19 (C19), to inform and support their responses.

This week, features resources on: **democratic backsliding** under C19; how C19 is **increasing gender inequality in conflict** affected contexts, and is increasing **domestic violence and child maltreatment**, with lifelong consequences; and how C19 is affecting the **world of work, public budgeting** and **food markets**.

Many of the core C19 themes continue to be covered this week, including: C19-related **corruption**; and how existing inequalities exacerbate the **unequal burdens and risks of C19**, e.g. regarding **vulnerable youth** and **socioeconomic inequalities**.

The summary uses two main sections – (1) literature: – this includes policy papers, academic articles, and long-form articles that go deeper than the typical blog; and (2) blogs & news articles. See the end of this report for details on the method taken for this rapid summary. It is the result of one day of work, and is thus indicative but not comprehensive of all issues or publications.

This policy brief draws on a new dashboard by V-Dem that tracks the effects of C19 on democratic standards in 146 countries. It finds:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Most democracies have addressed C19 with no or only minor violations of democratic standards. • There are concerning developments in 89 countries. Most were already autocratic before the pandemic. • The Pandemic Backsliding Index identifies the risk that a government is using the pandemic to erode already weak democratic institutions. The areas of most concern are: media freedom, limitations on the legislature, and the discriminatory and abusive enforcement of emergency measures.

This report finds:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • 93% of workers globally live in countries with some workplace closure measures. • C19 is disproportionately affecting women workers as they are more likely to work in the service sector and in front-line occupations, and to do unpaid care work. Gains made in addressing gender inequality in the labour market over the past few decades may be lost. • The actual labour market outcomes in the remainder of 2020 will be shaped by policy choices and actions as well as by the pandemic's future trajectory.

		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • ILO projections suggest that the labour market recovery during the second half of 2020 will be uncertain and incomplete. • Moving to a job-rich recovery requires: (a) finding the right policy balance; (b) sustaining interventions at scale; (c) supporting vulnerable and hard-hit groups and generating fairer labour market outcomes; (d) securing international solidarity and support; and (e) strengthening social dialogue and respect for rights at work.

It focuses on budgeting processes, not fiscal policies.

This note explores how rising hunger and malnutrition due to C19 threaten primarily low-income countries, but also advanced economies, and implications for expenditure policies. It focuses on: (1) the food supply at the stage of agricultural production; (2) midstream and downstream components of food supply chains; (3) the demand side, price developments, and food security; (4) trends and policy recommendations with regard to international trade in food products; and (5) existing and proposed policies and interventions to strengthen food access.
Power and Social Control of Youth during the COVID-19 Pandemic	Myra Gayle Gabriel, Aishia Brown, Maria León & Corliss Outley;	How are C19 responses and inequality affecting youth? This journal article explores how C19 is exposing multiple injustices and forms of oppression experienced by the most vulnerable, including young people experiencing poverty, incarceration, foster care, homelessness, and those with marginalised identities. E.g. leisure

	Leisure Sciences; Journal article	activities are important for youth to support healthy growth and development, mental health, building social skills, and reducing disease later in life. Yet vulnerable youth are less likely to have access to limited leisure activities during C19. And power exerted through policy enactment is often used to practice social control on marginalised youth and their communities.

Gender & the Covid-19 Crisis in Conflict-Affected Context	Search for Common Ground (SFCG); Discussion Paper	How is C19 affecting gender in conflict affected contexts? This discussion paper, based on consultations with 30 SFCG teams, finds: most people left out of public information campaigns will be women; women reject protection and prevention measures because of mistrust and fatalism; in many places, women and girls have fewer options to protect themselves (e.g. lacking autonomy and resources); women and girls face increased risk of gender-based violence; as lockdown means people consume more media at home, the media will have an outsized impact on gender norms; women will suffer more from the economic disruption; C19 creates challenges and opportunities for women's political participation; government responses discriminate against vulnerable women and girls; and stricter security enforcement puts women civilians at risk.
Domestic Violence and Child Maltreatment during COVID-19	Professor Siddhartha Bandyopadhyay; University of Birmingham; Report	How is C19 affecting domestic violence and child maltreatment in the UK? This report finds a marked increase in domestic violence and child maltreatment related to C19, with both having large lifetime cost to the victims and the public health system due to the

		increased likelihood of mental illness and chronic diseases. There is an urgent need to improve health surveillance through: routine enquiry of domestic violence or child maltreatment exposure; repurposing of active surveillance methods; linking data between police, health and social care; using data (e.g. through twitter and language analysis) to understand better the scale of the problem; and providing secure access to anonymised hospital and police datasets.

C19 has compounded an already dire economic situation by reducing tax and oil revenues and suppressing the informal sector. Protestors have demanded access to petrol and medicine, a response to corruption, and faster democratic response.</p>

C19 has heightened socioeconomic inequalities, with demonstrators calling for employment opportunities, government financial assistance and public subsidies to address C19's disproportionate impact on low-income communities and their access to basic services and goods.</p>

Suggested citation

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Methodology

Due to the emerging nature of the Covid-19 crisis, this rapid weekly summary includes blogs, and news articles, in addition to policy and academic literature. The sources included are found through searches of Google Scholar, Google, and ReliefWeb with the keywords:

("COVID-19" OR "coronavirus") AND ("developing countries" OR "Africa" OR "Asia" OR "Middle East" OR "Latin America" OR "Pacific") AND ("conflict" OR "peace" OR "violence" OR "resilience" OR "fragility") OR ("authoritarian*" OR "democra*" OR "corrupt*" OR "transparency" OR "state legitimacy" OR "non-state actors" OR "state capacity" OR "state authority" OR "politic*" OR "state institutions")

The searches are restricted to articles published in the previous seven days, in English. This is complemented by: a focussed Twitter search (using just the pages of a small selection of research organisations, and key scholars/thinkers, including those funded by the UK government's Department for International Development (DFID)); and through email recommendations from DFID advisors and leading experts.
